




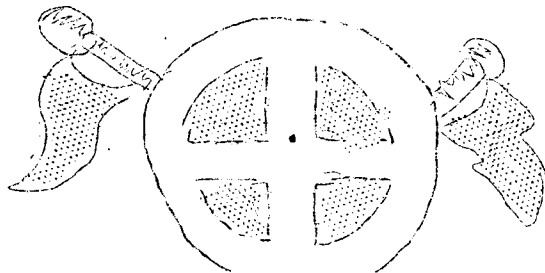

With all her energetic work on several committees, Miss Petty contributed a great deal to the elevation of school nursing in our state, and helped compile a set of medical standards for school health.

Miss Taylor, who has taught English, math, and social studies, also advised the Pierrepont Quill and the Park School newspaper. At our Junior High she has sponsored several reading and travel clubs.

In her spare time, we find Miss Taylor gardening or bird-watching with her sister, Miss Helen Taylor, also a former Rutherford teacher. She also enjoys driving and traveling, and is an accomplished horsewoman.

Mrs. Paul, a graduate of Barnard College, received her master's degree from Montclair State College. She first taught at Park Junior High in 1929; in 1958 she came to RJHS. Besides

teaching hygiene, spelling, algebra, math, and English, Mrs. Paul has been advisor to the Student Council and is the sponsor of Porta, our honor society. She is also responsible for the excellent monitoring of our halls and stairways.

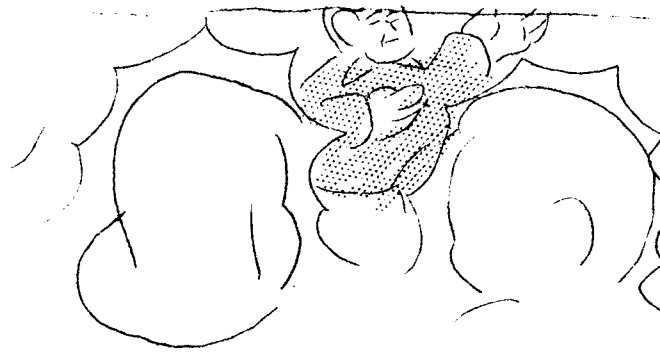

It is difficult to imagine our school without Mrs. Paul and Miss Taylor, but we at Rutherford Junior High School wish them both every happiness and best fortune in the future.

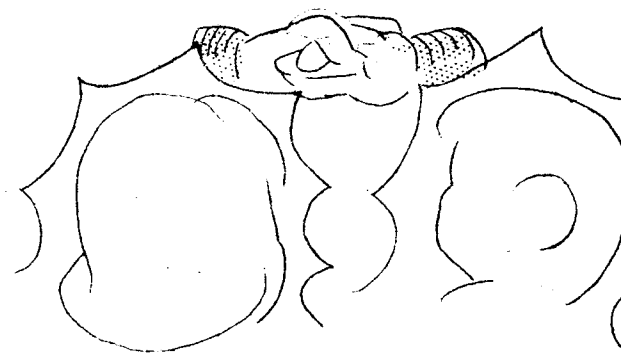
